

We use AT with...

1. Particular points on the clock. For example:

The competition started at nine o'clock.

We use AT with...

2. With particular points in the day:

The band left the stage AT MIDNIGHT.

We use AT with...

3. With particular points in the week:

What did you do at the weekend?

4. With special celebrations:

At the New Year, millions of people travel home to be with their families.

Exception:
We say
ON your birthday.
Not
AT your birthday.
```

5. We don't use AT with the question "What time ...?" in informal situations:

What time are you leaving? (preferred to At what time are you leaving?)



At or on?

We use at to talk about public holidays and weekends, but when we talk about a particular special day or weekend, we use on.

In or on?

We use in with morning, afternoon, evening and night, but we use on when we talk about a specific morning, afternoon, etc., or when we describe the part of the day.

Compare

I always work best in the morning. I often get tired in the afternoon.

The ship left the harbour on the morning of the ninth of November.

In the evening they used to sit outside and watch the sun going down.

It happened on a beautiful summer's evening.

At or in?

In the night usually refers to one particular night; at night refers to any night in general:

I was awake in the night, thinking about all the things that have happened.

'It's not safe to travel at night,' the officer said.







Irregular Verbs

Most irregular verbs, however, take a different form in the simple past tense.

Spelling File Simple Past Base Form bend bent broke break brought bring bought buy fall fell fly flew get got

Spelling File	
Base Form	Simple Past
beat	beat
burst	burst
cost	cost
cut	cut
hit	hit
hurt	hurt
put	put
read	read

The simple past tense of some irregular verbs does *not* change at all.

altogether from London. It wasn't much fun. In fact it was a


nightmare!
